Mental Health Services for Preschool Children

Updates and Networking

<u>Heather Hawk</u> – The Early Childhood Council serves children and families in licensed care centers with two individuals trained in early childhood mental health and infant mental health. They support young children through consultations with teachers in 61 classrooms in La Plata County and Archuleta County. 1800 hours of consultation services are provided each year for infants up through kindergarten.

<u>Lynn Westberg</u> – CHAC will have an annual planning meeting in February. Please be thinking about what our focus should be since we didn't get the grant we had applied for.

<u>Anne Dizenzo</u> – The Axis Senior Reach program works with adults age 60 and over who are socially isolated and who don't come into the Asix clinic. They provide individual counseling and care coordination for about 30 people per year. They work with the Senior Center and Mercy serving Bayfield, Ignacio, Durango and Silverton.

<u>Liza Tregillus</u> – She started a new non-profit called Durango Café au Play that may end up being part of the Family Center. It started 7 months ago in the Smiley Building and has served almost 300 families. It is a drop-in parent support space that's open 24/7. The primary mission is support for parents with children age 0-4 years. The is also a peer support group for teens and young adults with health problems. Children can

be left for up to 3 hours at a time if the parent is in the building. Help is also available for parents of young adults. A space with outdoor access is needed. Membership is \$20/month and scholorships are available.

<u>Sheila Casey</u> – The mission of Senior Services is to enhance the quality of life and support independence for adults age 60 and over. The three sites are in Durango, Bayfield and Ignacio. Services include meals, transportation, home chore services, durable medical equipment, activities and classes, and caregiver support program. There is also training for Medicare counselors who are always needed. 20% of the population in LPC is over 60.

<u>Eileen Wasserbach</u> – The Ignacio Early Learning Program is replacing the Head Start program and should open in January. The fee will be \$36/day and there will be 2 preschool classrooms and 1 toddler classroom. The Peaceful Spirit program will be absorbed by another program. The MST program should start up again and will need a supervisor.

<u>Scott Mathis</u> – The Centura system has begun cutbacks that will amount to \$350 million. Specific changes for Mercy will be announced in January.

The next monthly CHAC meeting is scheduled for <u>January 11, 8:30-10:00 a.m.</u> at the Durango Rec. Center.
